"I'd like to think 'It will happen when you least expect it' is true so that I'll think less about how single I am and how awesome cats are," says Mel, 25. "But surely the number of people who do put themselves out there to find someone is similar to the number who sit back and wait for it to happen."

So we're in agreement

But I totally get it – people who
are in relationships need a response

Von Gija has some useful counsel for the singles. "Although I'm not a huge fan of clichés, there is an underlying truth [to 'It will happen when you least expect it'] that's useful. When we invest a lot of psychological and emotional energy into the search we exude an air of desperation that tends to turn off potential mates.

"If we relax, get in touch with our patience, and be OK with being single for now, then lo and behold it is more likely to happen."

And my two cents' worth? If you ask me, making time to meet someone, get to know them then prioritise your relationship, doesn't happen without a little emotional elbow grease.
